Background

- Monitoring of projects is legally required
 - A responsibility of the Nunavut Impact Review Board under the Nunavut Land Claims Agreement (NLCA 12.2.2)
- SEMCs established in 2007 in response to increased resource development in Nunavut
 - Greater efficiency and consistency in monitoring



Regional Approach



- 3 separate SEMCs
 - Qikiqtaaluk SEMC
 - Kitikmeot SEMC
 - Kivalliq SEMC
 - Committee is chaired by the Department of ED&T

Socio-Economic Monitoring Committee

Purpose of monitoring

- 1. Identify whether predicted changes are taking place
- 2. Determine if unpredicted adverse impacts are occurring
- 3. Ensure companies are mitigating any adverse effects as legally required




