

The North: how do we compare?

- 1/3 of Canada
- Less than 75k residents
- Arctic conditions & climate
- Virtually undeveloped with little infrastructure
- High costs
- Least mapped region of Canada
- Most heavily subsidized region of Canada
- Economic options are few & community opportunities are needed
- Non-renewable resources are the economic advantage




Area of NWT + Nunavut = Norway, Sweden, Finland, Denmark, France, Germany, Poland, Spain, Portugal, Italy combined.



Mining is the largest private sector contributor in Nunavut

- One mine in Nunavut already makes largest private sector economic contribution
- And this does not include exploration
- Exploration and mining also contribute to other sectors, e.g. real estate, transportation and construction






Our industry creates significant benefits

- Mining is the largest employer of Aboriginal people
- Mining in Canada is projected to need 120,000 workers by 2024 *
- Nunavut Mining Jobs needed at peak (overlap)
 – over 8000
- Total person years employment

 nearly 100,000






Value of Mineral Production, 2014(p)

Northern Canada Mineral Exploration





 - 2013 figures are final estimates; 2014 figures are revised spending intentions as of March 2015.


Northern Canada Mineral Exploration




Nunavut Exploration Share






Northern Canada Mineral Exploration By Commodity Sought in 2015

- 13 Gold

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
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- 8 Base Metals

What can we do together – Some thoughts

- Important to tell the world that NUNAVUT enthusiastically welcomes mining and exploration investment
 - Publicize/revise/ implement Nunavut Mining Strategy
- Responsible mineral development is critical for the economic well-being of Nunavut
 - "To create the conditions for a strong and sustainable minerals industry that contributes to a high and sustainable quality of life for all Nunavummiut" (p. 7)
 - "Nunavut's future economic viability, and the improvement of the quality of life for Nunavummiut will depend on the development of these known and yet to be discovered (mineral) resources" (p. 44)

Other opportunities for collaboration

- Important to address costs and certainty
- Lobby for Regulatory Improvements
 - Champion exploration & mining incentives and limit cost burdens on exploration activity
 - Create certainty of land access through a completed land use plan
 - Bring NUPPAA into force
- Important to message and market Nunavut
